

Can This Legacy Application Be Safely Retired?

A 1-page shutdown readiness assessment for IT leaders reducing cost, risk, and application dependency

Legacy applications often survive modernization when no one can prove what happens to required information after shutdown. Use this assessment to determine whether the business can safely live without the application.

HIGH-RISK SHUTDOWN SIGNALS

☐ No confirmed business owner

☐ Unknown reports / workflows / integrations

☐ Users still search app for old information

☐ Data only makes sense inside original app

☐ Metadata, history, or context may be lost

☐ Retention or disposal rules unclear

3+ signals = controlled retirement project, not a simple shutdown

SHUTDOWN READINESS TRIAGE Check Yes, No, or Unknown. Then use the Decision Guide to choose the retirement path.

1. Business Dependency

Teams / departments / processes still using app are known. ☐ ☐ ☐

DECISION GUIDE: CHOOSE THE RETIREMENT PATH

Quick rule: Unknown dependency = Discovery Required. No/Unknown in information or access = Access Plan Required. Active critical use = Not Ready.

Ready to Retire

Use when: Mostly Yes; low dependency; required information is understood; access is clear.

Next: Plan validation, sign-off, and shutdown.

Access Plan Required

Use when: App can go, but information must stay searchable, secure, auditable, and usable.

Next: Define what stays accessible, who needs it, and how access works.

Watch out: File exports lose metadata/context; read-only instances keep cost/risk; backups are not searchable or audit-ready. An access plan is not a storage plan.

Discovery Required

Use when: Ownership, usage, retention, permissions, reports, or exports are unclear.

Next: Complete targeted discovery before setting a date.

Not Ready to Retire

Use when: App still supports active processes, reporting, integrations, or critical access.

Next: Document blocker and resolution plan.

FINAL SHUTDOWN READINESS TEST

After shutdown, can required information still be found, accessed, secured, and used to answer audit, legal, compliance, records, or public information requests without recreating the risk the organization is trying to retire?

SHORTCUT CHECK

If the plan depends on a file share, backup, or license the organization still has to maintain, the test fails.
